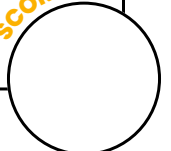
STUDENT CARE CENTRE (SCC) POLICIES

- All staff receive foundational training on identifying and supporting students with mild SEN in a SCC setting.
- There is a designated staff member or team overseeing SEN support in the SCC.
- SEN matters are discussed regularly during staff meetings.
- There are open channels for communication with parents/ caregivers to share observations, updates, and strategies for supporting children with SEN at home and in the SCC.
- My SCC collaborates with professionals in the partner schools (e.g., Learning Support Coordinators and School Counsellors) to support students with SEN in SCC.
- Protocols are in place to de-escalate minor conflicts or stress, tailored to support students with mild SEN in a respectful, non-stigmatising way.
- My SCC is supportive of accommodations that help students focus better (e.g., high tables, kick bands, disc-o-seats).
- Staff have access to an up-to-date inventory of adaptive materials.

STUDENT CARE CENTRE (SCC) ENVIRONMENT

- Clear signage is displayed for key areas (e.g. toilets, classrooms, staff office).
- Prominent safety signage and rules are visibly displayed.
- Shared spaces are accessible for students with varying needs.

SCORE:

CLASSROOM ENVIRONMENT

- A dedicated space (e.g. cushion corner, sensory area) is available for students needing short breaks.
- Classroom walls are visually calming and free of overwhelming displays.
- Students with SEN are seated away from distractions (e.g. corridors, harsh lighting).
- Timetables are printed clearly with readable fonts and visuals, and displayed prominently.
- Seating options and workspace arrangements are flexible and allow easy supervision.
- Teachers provide instructions using at least two modalities (e.g. visual and verbal).
- Teachers use simplified, student-friendly explanations during homework support.
- A safe environment is created for students to ask questions.
- Important information on the whiteboard is clearly marked and stays up long enough for copying.
- Slides and worksheets are clutter-free, use at least size 12 sans serif fonts, and are printed single-sided.
- Peer-support or mentoring systems help integrate students with mild SEN.
- Programmes and enrichment activities are differentiated to engage a range of abilities.
- A variety of learning and recreational resources are available for students to choose from.
